BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES (Unapproved) Regular Meeting, Wednesday, April 14, 2021

1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 4:06 p.m.

2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

3. ROLL CALL

All Board Members were present.

4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

a. Regular meeting minutes of February 10, 2021. Board Member Brownrigg motioned to approve. Board Member Cole seconded the motion. Approved 4-0-0.

5. REPORT OUT FROM CLOSED SESSION

a. Jean Savaree, legal counsel, reported that direction was given and no action was taken.

6. PUBLIC COMMENTS - NON-AGENDA

No public comments.

7. CONSENT CALENDAR

There are no consent calendar items for this meeting.

8. PUBLIC HEARING

a. A Public Hearing to approve the Resolution to Adopt the Fiscal Year 2021-2022 Budget for the Central County Fire Department

Chief Barron gave a brief overview of the 2021-2022 Budget (Staff Report, PowerPoint)

- There is a reclassification of an Office Assistant position to a Management Assistant position for succession planning purposes; no addition of personnel.
- 5.1% increase in this budget, which is a 1.1% change from last year.
- Operating revenue is at a deficit of 3.8% with permits/licensing, and city business down across the board due to COVID-19; Shop revenue is down as we no longer service San Mateo's rigs; Joint Training is a bit of a wash as we supply personnel to Training (one Battalion Chief) at about the same cost of training for engine companies; with WUI inspections on a calendar year, and the budget on a fiscal year, half of the revenue is from last year with this 21-22 budget projecting \$140,000.
- The main driver of operating expenditures is wages and benefits, with PERS/OPEP costs increasing and a 3% contractual COLA increase for firefighters; there is a slight decrease in overtime costs due to retirements and, of note, with credit to Ann and Lisa, we pre-hired personnel and used personnel and not overtime to cover vacancies. Last year, we had to use some of our reserves to pick up some of the deficits to balance the budget, but not this year.
- Some of the capital expenditures we are expecting this year are replacement of an engine; a new command vehicle at about \$65,000, radio equipment at approx. \$75,000; new PPE (turnouts) at about \$4,000 \$5,000 per set.

Member Chuang commended Administrative Officer Ritzma, City Manager Goldman and Chief Barron on the strategy of pre-hiring personnel.

Member Brownrigg inquired about briefing Millbrae on the proposed budget. CAO Ritzma indicated that the Millbrae City Manager and Finance Director are aware of the increase in the budget and they understand we are not deferring this year and that the cost to be paid is 5.1%.

Member Brownrigg gave kudos to the team for keeping personnel costs manageable in light of obligations and mandates.

Board Chair Ortiz inquired about the reimbursement of worker's compensation costs. Finance Director Cooke stated that it is the accounnting between the worker's compensation insurance fund and the general fund. The general fund incurs associated disability costs and then the worker's compensation insurance fund reimburses for that.

9. STAFF REPORTS

a. Fire Chief's Update (Oral Report)

Chief Barron gave a brief update:

Donation to CCFD

Earlier this year, a local Burlingame family, The Betts', donated \$15,027.78 to the department for the purchase of two thermal imaging cameras (TIC). The cameras have been ordered and the intent is to thank and host the Betts family and show them how the cameras work.

• First Responder COVID-19 Vaccniation Clinics

 CCFD has assisted in 13 mass vaccination clinics at SFO and the San Mateo County Event Center. CAL OES has agreed to reimburse all Fire agencies that assisted, which is about \$20,000 to CCFD. Similarly, reimbursement of \$189,000 for the Strike Teams deployed in January has been submitted.

• New Computer-Aided Dispatch (CAD) System

• New dispatch system is up and running. All officers have been encouraged to give constructive feedback to County Dispatch to help improve the program.

OES Type VI

Apparatus now expected at the end of April.

• Standards of Cover Study

CCFD will be going out to bid at the end of April for a Standards of Cover Study, which is a study done by an outside agency that dives deep in to all things CCFD from staffing, call volume, station locations, traffic patterns, dispatch run times, future community development, present development, department facilities, population and more. The study is expected to take about 3-4 months, looking at September-October to receive the study and recommendations.

• Classification Study for CCFD Operation Battalion Chief Position

• In the past, CCFD had nine on-duty Battalion Chiefs. At present, there are three on-duty 48-hour Battalion Chiefs with 7 stations to manage but the workload has not been reduced. Together with HR Manager Armbruster, a classification study that will be done to take a look at where a bit of time can be saved in the Battalion Chief's day to day of managing personnel, coaching, counseling and developing our future leaders to bring CCFD in to the future.

• New Firefighters

• Two new Firefighters in the academy, Christian Kadash and Joe Plume, have just completed their first major evaluation in their 15 week long program. CCFD is very proud of their progress thus far.

Captain's Test

- 12 applicants for Captain's promotional test.
- Written exam held March 29th, assessment center scheduled for April 28th and 29th.
- Chief's interviews scheduled for May 5th and 6th.

• Town of Hillsborough WUI Program

- Goal to complete 2,832 inspections by end of year; as of April 9th we're at 25% completion.
- Kudos to Fire Marshal Reed and the entire Prevention staff for all of their hard work.

• New Ladder Truck

- Order placed for new aerial ladder truck.
- Chassis fabrication is expected to begin in September with final assesmbly set for January 2022, delivery expected by spring 2022.

• Recruitment Efforts

 Recruitment process for new hires underway, looking to hire two Firefighters for two upcoming retirements and three firefighters for a fall 2021 San Mateo County Fire Academy. One firefighter will be leaving to Oakland Fire Department.

Chief Barron gave kudos to the CCFD Administrative staff for their ongoing work behind the scenes.

Board Chair Ortiz thanked all involved with the budget.

Board Member Cole extended thanks to Chief Barron and staff for all of the work at the vaccination sites and also inquired about the new TIC cameras made possible by Betts family donation and how they work.

Chief Barron explained that TIC cameras (thermal imaging camera) have a lifespan of 3-4 years and that CCFD uses them to "see" with infrared technology through darkness or smoke, allowing firefighters to quickly find the heat signature of visually obscured victims or objects.

Board Member Chuang expressed her gratitude for the work of Fire Marshal Reed and the Prevention staff for getting the WUI program up and running, the inspections and for the behind-the-scenes educational aspect of the entire endeavor.

10. NEW BUSINESS

a. Resolution to Adopt the Salary Schedule for the Central County Fire Department

Human Resources Manager Kristin Armbruster presented the resolution to adopt the salary schedule and stated that any time changes are made to the salary schedule, PERS requires approval by the Board in public session which is then made available on the Central County Fire Department website. The salary schedule includes the contractual increases for the labor represented groups and the cost of living (COLA) increases for the non-represented groups and a new temporary classification to meet the wage requirements in 2022.

Board Member Chuang motioned to approve and adopt item 10a. Board Member Cole seconded the motion. Approved 4-0-0.

b. Resolution Authorizing the Execution of an Agreement Between the Central County Fire Department and the City of South San Francisco for Provision of Maintenance and Repair Services for Fire Apparatus and Fleet Vehicles

Chief Barron shared that South San Francisco Fire was down a few of their Fire Mechanics and this temporary maintenance and repair agreement with CCFD would be to assist them while new Fire Mechanics are trained and certified.

Board Chair Ortiz asked if this was a budget neutral arrangement. Chief Barron confirmed that it is a temporary agreement as a back up resource in the event that rigs are inoperable.

Board Member Brownrigg motioned to approve item 10b. Board Member Chuang seconded the motion. Approved 4-0-0.



Recommendation:

Adopt the Resolution allowing the addition of a Roth feature and a loan program to the existing 457 Deferred Compensation plan.

Background:

The Central County Fire Department has an existing Deferred Compensation 457 ("457") plan which allows participants to defer a portion of their pay on a pre-tax basis into an account that can be drawn upon after retirement. These benefits are essential to support employee's goals toward saving and providing for their retirement needs.

The Department now wishes to add two components to the 457 plan:

- A loan program, whereby an employee can borrow against their account balance for things like a home purchase down payment and educational expenses.
- A Roth component, whereby an employee can make after-tax contributions to their 457 plan. Contributions and associated earnings to a Roth account can be withdrawn tax-free in certain circumstances, further increasing an employee's retirement security.

Fiscal Impact:

There are no fiscal impacts to the department other than administrative time as the fees for each program are passed to the participants.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Central County Fire Department adopts the Resolution Adopting the Modification of the ICMA-RC 457 Deferred Compensation Plan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Central County Fire Department hereby amends and restates the Plan in the form of The ICMA Retirement Corporation 457 Governmental Deferred Compensation Plan & Trust.
